## Dear Cities for Mobility Friends,

For many years in urban planning the maxim was to separate the various areas spatially: areas for working, living, leisure, consumerism and education. A central consequence of this maxim

was an increase in mobility and traffic, in an effort to connect these separate areas. This growing need for more mobility was, at the end of the day, met with the construction of more roads.

The car-friendly city also shaped our way of thinking. "We are too obsessed with arriving," is as Leon Wieseltier puts it in his essay "The Art of Wandering". With the enormous spread of automotive mobility, arriving – reaching a destination – became easy, comfortable and fast. However, nowadays it is difficult to keep what that product actually promised. For many people mobility means polluted air, noise, traffic jams and stress. All over the world under the

generic term "Sustainable mobility" people are seeking ways to get out of this traffic chaos, but more often than not, we fall back into the old patterns and respond to the new questions with old answers.

Is it enough to build more cycle tracks and foot paths, to improve local public transport and offer a more intelligent control of traffic? Or do we have to make a fundamental make-over of our idea of City and Mobility? Is it not time to think more about the "software" of our cities, that is, about behaviour, networking, communication, intelligent incentive systems and, most of all, about how we can improve our citizens' quality of life.

I would like to invite you to join us and some very bright minds from all over the world to discuss how we can make mobility and our cities more humane.

### Workshop I

#### » *Avoid*

Sustainable mobility can be created if we can manage to avoid motorized private transport. This is possible for example with land use planning and housing development concepts that concentrate on short distances, for instance between work and home. With a good and safe network of footpaths and amenities close-by to meet everyday needs, active mobility is possible with less usage of car.

### Workshop II

#### » *Shift*

Sustainable mobility can be achieved if we shift from the private car to public transport or walking and cycling. We can do this for example by giving priority to local traffic through attractive intermodal and multimodal offers, such as car and bike sharing, through first-class information when it comes to choosing a means of transport, and through incentives, such as job tickets as well as an increase in the awareness for the needs of pedestrians and cyclists.

### Workshop III

#### » *Improve*

Sustainable mobility can be achieved if we manage to control the traffic more efficiently, thus reducing traffic jams and pollutants. We can optimise the flow of traffic by means of telematics, information and logistical concepts and the stationary traffic by parking management. We are making an important contribution to this, insofar as we are using more electro-mobility both at private and public level.
