"Drawing on the general principles of better regulation, EU legislation should be designed so that it achieves the objectives at minimum cost without imposing unnecessary legislative burdens. In this sense the Urban Agenda for the EU will contribute to the Better Regulation Agenda."


Urban Agenda for the EU – Pact of Amsterdam, Article 5.1 "The Urban Agenda for the EU will not create new or increased EU funding aimed at higher allocations for Urban Authorities. However, it will draw from and convey lessons learned on how to improve funding opportunities for Urban Authorities across all EU policies and instruments, including Cohesion Policy."

Urban Agenda for the EU – Pact of Amsterdam, Article 5.2 "Reliable data is important for portraying the diversity of structures and tasks of Urban Authorities, for evidence-based urban policy making, as well as for providing tailor-made solutions to major challenges."



GOVERNANCE AND PLANNING


Many transport challenges are met by local and regional governments close to citizens and competent in managing urban mobility.
